

SERVING VITAL INTERESTS: AUSTRALIA'S STRATEGIC PLANNING IN PEACE AND WAR

Professor Roger Beaumont has taught history at Texas A&M University since 1974. His publications include *Military Elites* (1975), *Sword of the Raj* (1977), *Joint Military Operations: A Short History* (1993) and *War, Chaos and History* (1995). He has served on active duty as a military police officer in the US Army, was a Secretary of the Navy Fellow at the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, 1989-90, has lectured at several service schools and is a co-founder and former North American editor of *Defense Analysis*.

Professor Peter Dennis is head of the School of History at the University College, Australian Defence Force Academy. A graduate of the University of Adelaide and Duke University in the United States, he is the author or editor of seven books, including (with others) *The Oxford Companion to Australian Military History* (1995) and, with Jeffrey Grey, a volume of the Official History of Australian Involvement in Southeast Asian Conflicts, *Emergency and Confrontation: Australian Military Operations in Malaya and Borneo, 1950-1966* (1996).

Dr Peter Edwards is the Official Historian of Australia's involvement in Southeast Asian conflicts 1948-75. In addition to being general editor of the series, he is the principal author of *Crises and Commitments* (1992) and the author of *A Nation at War* (1997 forthcoming). He is also the author and editor of several books relating to the history of Australian foreign policy. Dr Edwards is currently the Executive Director of the Australian Centre for American Studies, located at the University of Sydney.

Dr Michael Evans has been an historian in the Directorate of Army Research and Analysis since 1995. He read history at the universities of Rhodesia and Western Australia and war studies at King's College, London, where he was a Beit Fellow (an award similar to the Rhodes Scholarship). He served in the Rhodesian Army during the Zimbabwe independence war. Between 1981 and 1987, he was closely involved in the creation of the postwar Zimbabwe National Army, serving as Director of War Studies and on secondment to the British Army to assist in the creation of the Zimbabwe Staff College. He has held visiting fellowships in war studies at the University of Cape Town and the University of York, England.

Dr Jeffrey Grey is a senior lecturer in history at the University College, Australian Defence Force Academy. A graduate of the Australian National University and the University of New South Wales, he is the author or editor of ten books in the field of Australian and comparative military history including, most recently (with Peter Dennis), *Emergency and Confrontation* (1996).

Major General John Hartley graduated from RMC Duntroon in 1965. Posted to infantry, he served with 5RAR on its first tour of Vietnam between 1966 and 1967, and undertook a second tour as an adviser to the South Vietnamese in 1970. He has held a variety of staff and training appointments. He is a graduate of the University of Queensland, the Army Staff College, the Joint Services Staff College, and the US Army War College. He was appointed GOC Training Command in 1991, and was Director of the Defence Intelligence Organisation, 1992-95. He was appointed DCGS in September 1995.

Dr David Horner is a Fellow in the Strategic and Defence Studies Centre at the Australian National University. He graduated from RMC Duntroon in 1969 and served with 3RAR in the Republic of Vietnam in 1971. He retired from the Army as a lieutenant colonel in 1990. He holds an MA with First Class Honours from the University of New South Wales and a PhD from the Australian National University, for which he received the Crawford Prize in 1981. He is the author or editor of 18 books in the fields of Australian military history, strategy and defence policy, including *Crisis of Command* (1978), *The Gulf Commitment* (1992) and *Inside the War Cabinet: Directing Australia's War Effort 1939-1945* (1996), and has lectured widely on military history and strategic affairs.

Lieutenant General John Sanderson was appointed Chief of the General Staff in July 1995. His previous position was Commander, Joint Forces Australia, following his appointment as military commander of the United Nations Transitional Authority in Cambodia, 1992-93.

Dr Charles R ['Reg'] Shrader served for 23 years with the United States Army, including two tours of Vietnam, retiring as a lieutenant colonel in 1987. He holds a PhD in mediaeval history from Columbia University, New York, and is a graduate of the US Army War College and the NATO Defense College. He was the first Director of the Combat Studies Institute at Leavenworth, held instructor posts in history at West Point and the Command and General Staff College, Leavenworth, and was Chief of the Historical Services Division of the US Army Center of Military History in Washington, DC. The author of numerous papers and books, he has published widely in the field of logistic history, including *US Military Logistics 1607-1991: A Research Guide* (1992), *Communist Logistics in the Korean War* (1995), and a recently completed two-volume study of logistics in the French Indochina war. He is currently working on the transition from Soviet to western armaments in Indonesia in the period 1950-80.

Dr Thomas-Durrell Young has been a Research Professor at the Strategic Studies Institute of the US Army War College, Carlisle, since 1992. He received his PhD from the Graduate Institute of International Studies at the University of Geneva, Switzerland, and is a 1990 graduate of the US Army War College as well. He has worked as a country risk analyst for a Swiss-based consultancy firm, and between 1988 and 1992 was a National Security Affairs analyst. He has published extensively on US alliance issues with particular emphasis on western Europe and Australia, including *The 1994 Australian Defence White Paper: an American view* (1995) and *Australian, New Zealand and United States Security Relations, 1951-1986* (1992). His co-author, Douglas C Lovelace, Jr, is an associate of Dr Young at the Strategic Studies Institute of the US Army War College, Carlisle.
