Stephen Badsey is a senior lecturer in the Department of War Studies at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst and a Senior Research Fellow at de Montfort University, Bedford. He is a specialist on the media in warfare and on modern military thought. His publications include *The Gulf War Assessed* (1992) with John Pimlott, *Modern Military Operations and the Media* (1994), *The Crimean War: The War Correspondents* with Andrew Lambert (1994), and *The Media and International Security* (1999).

Lieutenant General Peter Cosgrove is Chief of Army. Prior to taking up that position in July 2000 he was Commander of the International Force in East Timor (INTERFET).

Peter Dennis is professor of history at University College, University of New South Wales, Australian Defence Force Academy. Among his publications are (as joint editor and author) *The Oxford Companion to Australian Military History* (1995), and (as joint editor) the forthcoming seven-volume series, 'The Australian Centenary History of Defence' (2001).

Jeff Doyle teaches Media, Asia Pacific Studies, and Critical Theory in the School of Language, Literature and Communication, University College, University of New South Wales, Australian Defence Force Academy.

Michael Evans is a Senior Research Fellow in the Australian Army's Land Warfare Studies Centre, Duntroon. He did National Service in the Rhodesian Army and was later a regular officer in the Zimbabwe Army where he headed the war studies program and assisted the British Army in the establishment of a Staff College. Dr Evans is a graduate of the universities of Rhodesia, London and Western Australia, and has published many journal articles and papers on defence matters in Australia, the United States, Britain and South Africa.

Jeffrey Grey is an associate professor of history at University College, University of New South Wales, Australian Defence Force Academy. In 2000-01 he is the Major General Matthew C Horner Professor of Military Theory at the Marine Corps University, Quantico, Virginia. His volume in 'The Australian Centenary History of Defence' series, *The Australian Army*, will be published on the centenary of the Army, March 2001.

Paul McLeod has served in operational, training and intelligence posts in Australia and overseas since joining the Royal Australian Air Force in 1978. Wing Commander McLeod is a Chinese linguist, and holds degrees in business administration, economics, intelligence translation, management studies and applied languages.

Ian McGibbon is a Senior Historian in the Office of the Chief Historian of the New Zealand Ministry of Culture and Heritage. He has written extensively on aspects of New Zealand military and diplomatic history, his most recent publication being *The Oxford Companion to New Zealand Military History* (2000). In 1997 he was made an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to Historical Research.

Allan R Millett is the Major General Raymond E Mason, Jr Professor of Military History at The Ohio State University, and a retired colonel in the US Marine Corps Reserve. He has lectured in military schools in the United States, Europe and Asia, including an appointment as Distinguished Fulbright Professor at the Korean National Defense College in 1991. He is the current president of the US Commission on Military History. His many publications include co-authorship of the most widely-read general military history of the United States, *For the Common Defense* (1984), and, most recently (with Williamson Murray), *A War to Be Won: Fighting World War II* (2000).

Aryeh JS Nusbacher is on the staff at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst, where he teaches the Commissioning Course, as well as the Junior Command and Staff Course for the Joint Services Command and Staff College, Bracknell. A graduate of the University of Toronto and The Royal Military College of Canada, he completed his doctorate at Somerville College, University of Oxford, this year. He is a reserve army intelligence officer and a former infantryman.

Russell Parkin is a RAEME officer who joined the Australian Regular Army in 1990. Prior to that he was an officer in the General Reserve and held a number of staff and regimental postings. Major Parkin holds a Master of Defence Studies and a PhD in history from the University of New South Wales, Australian Defence Force Academy, and is currently a student at the Army Command and Staff College, Fort Queenscliff.
