

Questions:

I'm chasing comment from the Defence department in light of the Queensland govt announcing a ban on PFOS and PFOA and wanted to ask:

- The Qld environment minister, Steven Miles, says defence has gotten rid of PFOA and PFOS at Oakey. Can the department confirm this? If so, when and how?
- What will the defence department do to properly clean up the pollution it's caused in Oakey?
- The Minister says although the state government can't force the defence department to clean up, it has an "incredible moral duty" to do the right thing. What's the department's response to this?
- Anything else you would like to add?

Response:

Defence acknowledges the announcement made by the Queensland State Government on the phase out policy for legacy aqueous film forming foams.

Defence does not maintain stocks of the legacy aqueous film forming foams.

From 2004 - 2011, Defence phased out the legacy aqueous film forming foams. Defence transitioned to a new, more environmentally friendly product called Ansulite for use on the Defence estate. Ansulite is used by Defence in emergency situations where human life is at risk, or in controlled environments to test equipment. Any Ansulite used for testing is captured and treated and/or disposed of at licensed waste disposal facilities.

Defence is currently finalising a detailed environmental investigation to identify the extent and levels of PFOS and PFOA compounds on, and in the vicinity of, Army Aviation Centre - Oakey. All detailed site investigations, comprising of a preliminary site investigation and detailed site investigation, are undertaken in accordance with the National Environment Protection Measure Framework (NEPM), specifically the Assessment of Site Contamination measure.
