Defence Export Controls

Defence Export Controls (DEC) is the **Australian Government regulator** for the export or supply of defence-related technology, goods and services.

DEC's aim to **prevent harm** to Australia's security, defence and international relations through:



Policy and Reform



Assessments and permits



Education and Support



Regulatory Compliance Checks



Regulatory Approach



Policy, Technology, Reform

- Policy revisions
- ICT enhancements
- Co-design with industry, higher education and research sectors



Education and **Support**

- Training and Communications: e-Learning, web, events, guidance materials, newsletter
- Customer Support: tailored advice via phone and email. Gather feedback.



Collaborative. Risk based. Responsive.

Assessments and **Decisions**



- Assessing and issuing permits

Regulatory Compliance



- Reactive compliance: investigating voluntary disclosures and breaches
- Proactive Compliance through audits



Assessment criteria

- All permits are assessed on case by case basis.
- A permit may only be issued if the decision maker is satisfied the activity would not prejudice the security, defence or international relations of Australia.
- For most permit applications, this is assessed against 12 legislative criteria.
 These criteria broadly cover:
 - Sanctions
 - Human rights
 - National and regional security
 - Risk of diversion to weapons of mass destruction programmes, terrorist activities; and
 - Australia's international obligations and commitments.



Submitting Applications Tips and Tricks

 If information required to process a permit application is **not** provided or is incomplete submitting your application will be difficult and prevent progression through to submission.

Three most common errors

- 1. Selecting the wrong application type
- 2. Application error special characters are not permitted
- 3. Attaching password protected documents



Requests for Information

- If information required to process a permit application is not provided or is incomplete, DEC will send an Request for Information (RFI) to the applicant.
- Permit applicants will want to avoid RFIs because they delay application processing times.

Three most common RFIs

- 1. Consignee or end user details
- 2. Description of goods or technology
 - Provide as much information as possible
- 3. Absent or incorrect general details
 - e.g. single or multiple shipments; vague descriptions of line items;
 quantity of items



Application Processing Times and Stages

Your application will progress through four stages of assessment.

Four stages of Assessment

- 1. **Submitted** with our QA team making sure all information needed to assess is within the application
- 2. Under Assessment Stage 1 with our Technical Assessment Team
- 3. Under Assessment Stage 2 with our Risk Assessment Team
- **4. Final Stage** With the Delegate for review



Overview of the Licence-free Environment

Under the licence-free environment many military and dual-use goods, technologies and services can be **transferred without permits** between AUKUS partners.

- On 1 September 2024, this licence-free environment was enabled by legislative changes implemented by Australia, the US and UK.
- As a result, a 'national exemption' for the US and UK is now available for the Customs (PE)
 Regulations (Section 13E) and DTC Act (Sections 10, 10A, 10B, 10C, 15).
 - As at 1 November 2025, the changes facilitated over \$230 million in licence-free exports to the US and UK.
 - Over 500 Australian businesses have been approved for export licencing requirement exemptions with the US and UK
 - DEC received nearly 1300 Notifications of Intent to Export using the licence-free environment.



Benefits of the Licence-free Environment



Incentivises scientific, technological and industrial cooperation and co-development between Aus / US / UK



Reduced processing time improves timely shipment of goods and reduces the cost of holding exports.



Enables collaboration at speed and scale required to respond to challenges in strategic circumstances



Half the time to complete prenotifications vs permit application, with no amendments or renewals required.



Fast tracks the delivery of high-end capabilities to Australian Defence Force



Streamlined export declaration through ABF. One ID number vs multiple permit numbers over years.

How to maintain Compliance

It is important to meet your obligations under Australia's defence export control laws:

- 1 Attain permits from DEC when required
- 2 Keep records, both under permits and when relying on an exception
- 3 Adhere to the licence-free environment terms and conditions (if using)
- 4 Make a voluntary disclosure if non-compliance detected

Best-practice for maintaining compliance often involves clear policies around actions, processes, and behaviours that ensure alignment with legislative requirements
