

Second World War (WW 2) Bunker at Condell Park, Bankstown

As you may be aware Council has been exploring the possibility of restoring the Second World War (WW2) bunker located at Condell Park, Bankstown.

By the way of background, the bunker, located at the corner of Marion Street and Edgar Street, Condell Park, was constructed circa 1943. During the later part of the War (1943-45), the two storey underground concrete facility was used by the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) as their No 1 Fighter Sector Head Quarters (1FSHQ) base and the Allied Forces' Command post for the south-west Pacific.

Attached is copy of a recent report to Council, including information on the bunker, its post War history and potential options for restoration.

In April 1971, the then Commonwealth Minister for Housing announced that the Commonwealth would offer the underground facility to Bankstown Council for community use and that War Service homes would be built on the remainder of the 9 acre site. It now appears that the handing over of the bunker site to Council did not eventuate. The historic bunker is now buried beneath an open space, surrounded by clusters of War Service homes built during 1974-75.

Council's 2006 investigation on the possibility of restoring the WW2 Bunker for suitable reuse revealed that this is likely to be feasible only if the following issues could be resolved:

- 1. Determining the legal ownership of the Bunker site.
- 2. Determining access rights to the Bunker site from public roads
- Obtaining commitment from other stakeholders to be involved in the restoration.

Council also observed that the time and resources necessary to refit the facility to its Wartime condition would itself be significant and unaffordable for Council alone, unless a multi-stakeholder initiative can be ensured. The possibility of



Commonwealth, the ADF, the State Government and philanthropic involvement needs to be explored. Accordingly, at its Ordinary Meeting of 21 November 2006, Council resolved to:

Liaise with Commonwealth and State and try to ascertain their interest in heritage listing of the bunker and a proposal for a major restoration of the bunker as a public facility.

During 2007, Council wrote to the RAAF Head Quarters, Office of Air Force History, the Secretary Department of Defence, the Australian Heritage Council, the Royal Australian Historical Society, NSW Heritage Council and other relevant Commonwealth, State agencies and peak bodies to ascertain their interest in a project to restore the historical bunker.

The Secretary, Department of Defence referred the matter to the RAAF HQs for consideration by the RAAF Heritage Advisory Committee (RHAC) to ascertain whether RAAF or the ADF has an interest in the project.

In November 2008, the NSW Department of Lands advised Council that during the War the site was acquired for purposes of the Commonwealth, as notified in the Government Gazette of 9 August 1945. Since this time the site has not reverted to the Crown as Crown Land within the meaning of the Crown Lands Act, 1989 and as such the NSW Department of Lands has no further records relating to this parcel of land.

Accordingly, Council advised the RAAF HQs of this reply from the NSW Department of Lands regarding the ownership of the land where the bunker is buried.

In July 2009, Council received a reply from the Air Force HQs, which advised that the RAAF Heritage Advisory Committee (RHAC) had given due consideration to Council's request and decided that Defence support for restoration of the bunker should be conditional upon Bankstown Council determining the legal ownership of the land and developing a viable restoration project.

The RHAC also advised that should a bunker restoration project proceed, support from the Department of Defence would be limited to the provision of historical research assistance from the Office of Air Force History.

Although the ownership of the open space above the underground bunker appears to be still with the Commonwealth, with the adjacent strata plans having the right of way/easement over the actual bunker site, there seems to be some uncertainty about this among Commonwealth agencies.

At its meeting of 25 August 2009, Council resolved to seek your assistance "to clarify the ownership of this property [the bunker site] with the relevant Commonwealth Departments."



Council would appreciate your assistance in resolving this matter with the relevant Commonwealth Departments and in getting Commonwealth actively involved in the restoration of this WW2 historical site, particularly with a view to financial support, given that Council could not proceed with the project within its own resources.

BACKGROUND

WW2 Bunker at Condell Park

The Second World War (WW 2) bunker, located at the corner of Marion Street and Edgar Street, Condell Park, was constructed circa 1943. During the later part of the War (1943-45), the two storey underground concrete facility was used by the Royal Australian Airforce (RAAF) as their No 1 Fighter Sector Head Quarters (1FSHQ) base and the Allied Forces' Command post for the south-west Pacific. Attached (Attachment A) is a Fact Sheet on the bunker compiled by Council officers, which includes information on the site, its structure, post War history and potential options for restoration.

The Bunker could arguably be described as of some historic significance for Australia and an icon of Bankstown's War time history. Consequently, there has been some interest in restoring the facility for a suitable reuse, for example as a museum or a similar public facility.

In 1971, the Department of Defence handed over the 9 acre site to the Commonwealth Department of Housing for developing War Service homes. It was about this time the underground facility, kept secured since the end of the War, was rediscovered in an intact condition. Unfortunately, soon afterwards the historic facility was burned out. It was either an act of vandalism or a fire lit by homeless people who were known to squat there at the time.

In April 1971, the then Commonwealth Minister for Housing announced that the Commonwealth would offer the underground facility to Bankstown Council for community use and that War Service homes would be built on the remainder of the 9 acre site. It now appears that the handing over of the bunker site to Council did not eventuate. Therefore the ownership appears to be still with the Commonwealth, with the adjacent strata plans having the right of way/easement over the actual bunker site. The historic bunker is now buried beneath an open space, surrounded by clusters of War Service homes built during 1974-75.



Later in the year, in November 2007, Council wrote to the Secretary, Department of Defence and as a result the matter was referred back to the RAAF HQs for consideration by the RAAF Heritage Advisory Committee to ascertain whether RAAF or the ADF has an interest in the project.

As the Commonwealth Department of Defence and the RAAF was uncertain about the ownership of the bunker site, in December 2007 and again in October 2008, Council wrote to the Director General, NSW Department of Lands to ascertain the ownership of the open space at the site under which the bunker is believed to be situated.

In November 2008, Council received a reply from the NSW Department of Lands (Attachment B) advising that during the War the site was acquired for purposes of the Commonwealth, as notified in the Government Gazette of 9 August 1945. Since this time the site has not reverted to the Crown as Crown Land within the meaning of the Crown Lands Act, 1989 and as such the NSW Department of Lands has no further records relating to this parcel of land.

In December 2008, Council advised the RAAF HQs of this reply from the NSW Department of Land regarding the ownership of the land where the bunker is buried.

In July 2009, Council received a reply from the Department of Defence (copy in Attachment C). The Department advised that the RAAF Heritage Advisory Committee (RHAC) has given due consideration to Council's request and decided that Defence support for restoration of the bunker should be conditional upon Bankstown Council determining the legal ownership of the land and developing a viable restoration project.

The RHAC also advised that should a bunker restoration project proceed, support from the Department of Defence would be limited to the provision of historical research assistance from the Office of Air Force History.

No option available for potential restoration of the WW2 Bunker

The replies received from the NSW Department of Lands and the RAAF HQs hardly leave_Council_with_any_viable_option_to_proceed_with_the_restoration_of_the_WW2-Bunker at Condell Park.

Although the open space above the underground bunker still appears to be Commonwealth land, the surrounding strata plans have right of way/easement over this, thus making any future arrangement for entry/egress to and from the bunker hard to resolve, in a way suitable for a public facility.

ATTACHMENT A

World War 2 Bunker and RAAF Sector HQ at Condell Park, Bankstown, Southwestern Sydney.

Location of the Bunker

The World War 2 bunker, constructed circa 1943, is located at the corner of Marion Street and Edgar Street, Bankstown and is buried beneath an open space, surrounded by clusters of War Services homes (*Photos in Attachment -A*). In the past, the site used to be known as the bushland of Black Charlie's Hill. The site was originally owned by the Bankstown Hospital Trust and was later on acquired by the Commonwealth. The site was selected for the underground RAAF and Allied Command Post because of its proximity to the Bankstown Airport and the relay stations around the area.

Description of the Bunker

During the war, this bunker was used by the No. 1 Fighter Sector HQ, RAAF as the Allied Command Post for the entire South Pacific operation. There was a code room, radio transmitter room, kitchen, buffet (dining) area, male and female bathrooms, bedrooms and the main operation hall had a huge wall map of the Southwest Pacific Area.

From the available drawings (floor plans and sections) and photographs of the interior, it appears that the bunker itself is a two-storey facility - a basement and a ground floor each 9 feet (2.75m) high - measuring 117 feet 8.75 inches by 53 feet 9.5 inches (approx 35.9m x 16.4m) [Attachment-B]. The walls were constructed from brickwork approximately two feet (60cm) thick, with floors and ceilings of reinforced concrete. The roof of the bunker was constructed of three feet (91cm) thick concrete to make it bombproof. There were two exhaust air stacks and an air intake stack protruding above ground.

The underground facility housed an extensive communication system, which was reportedly linked to a control tower at Bass Hill. The bunker had an emergency power plant, air conditioning and 50 telephones installed.

A Brief Post-war History: Rediscovered and Burned Out in 1970s

After the war, the facility was closed and was assigned a caretaker for three years. At the end-of this-period, the facility-was-secured. Thereafter, the bunker-complex-had-remained-forgotten for nearly 30 years, except that in 1965 the facility was briefly occupied by the Navy in connection with the naval exercises in the Pacific. In 1971, the nine-acre site was handed over to the Commonwealth Department of Housing for developing War Services homes.

It was about this time that the existence of the underground headquarters was rediscovered in 1971 and the whole facility including all equipment, telephones and furniture were found to be intact [Photo in Attachment C].

On Wednesday the 21 April 1971, The Sydney Morning Herald, The Daily Telegraph and The Torch (local newspaper) simultaneously published news items disclosing the existence of the underground RAAF HQs and Allied Command Post.



Access to the Facility

Currently, the entrance and air vents are buried beneath the ground and are not identifiable. Reportedly, the main entrance to the bunker is now buried below the backyard of one of the villas. s47F , mentioned above, even had named the owner of this home in his 1994 article. It may be possible to explore and identify the location of the entrance from the copies of plans (construction drawings) available and information from people who reportedly entered the bunker in the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s.

As already mentioned, without further research, it cannot be immediately confirmed whether the actual bunker site (the vacant land) forms part of the adjoining strata plans or is still Commonwealth/public land. The legal ownership of the open space and access rights from public roads are primary issues that need to be investigated and sorted out first, before any option for restoration and reuse can be effectively considered.

Potential and Options for Restoration

From the copies of plans and other construction drawings available, the underground Command Post bunker appears to be a professionally designed and robustly constructed facility. Although furniture, soundproof wall claddings, ceilings, and artifacts were burned out, its concrete and brick shell is expected to still retain its structural integrity and soundness. So, it is likely to be feasible to restore the facility for suitable reuse, for example, as a museum or a similar public facility, subject to the ability to provide legal and safe access and egress.

When it was rediscovered in 1971, its interior was completely intact and a series of photographs taken at that time is still available, and restoration of the interior to its wartime look is considered still technically feasible. But this may be an affordable option only if the Commonwealth, State and other stakeholders are convinced of its historic significance and are willing to commit themselves to a restoration project.

A less expensive option will be to get the structural integrity and safety of the burned out shell confirmed by experts and then use it as-it-is as a historical facility or a compatible tourism or community related purpose, including a WW2 memorabilia museum or a light and sound WW2 history show. For example, in Mallacoota near Melbourne, local RSL and Historical Society converted a WW2 RAAF bunker at Mallacoota's airstrip into a military museum. Sappers from the Australian Army carried out the restoration work.


In Darwin, the East Point bunker where the army planned top end defence strategy during WW2 has been converted into a military museum. In Coffs Harbour, the City Council and the local Rotary Club joined hands and restored a derelict WW2 bunker to house the Australia's largest original cartoon collection, known as Bunker Cartoon Gallery. Only minor alterations were made to ensure the historical integrity of the structure was preserved.


The Way Forward

Definitely, the first step will be to research and gather more information about the ownership of the actual bunker site and feasibility of public access to it, if needed by acquiring use of the site from the Commonwealth and/or entering into an arrangement with the adjoining property owners, if that is feasible.

Another basic step is to go for a preliminary engineering, heritage and conservation assessment of the site. This may be followed by an initiative to get the site heritage listed. This status will facilitate involvement of Commonwealth and other stakeholders - including, for example, Australian Defence Forces, RSL, philanthropic organisations and the media - in the provision of funding, expertise and community support to help the project take off. For example, in 2006, the President of the Bankstown Sports Club had expressed interest in taking a proposal to his board to contribute to the restoration of the bunker.



In late 2007 this matter was referred to the Department of Finance and Deregulation (DoFD) for action as the last "owner" of the site appeared to have been the then Commonwealth Department of Housing. Any disposal/transfer action of Commonwealth property around that time would have been handled by an agency now subsumed by DoFD - the former Dept of Administrative Services or the Australian Property Group.

ASPS wrote to Council advising them of the DoFD point of contact (copy attached). To date I have been unable to locate either a response from Council or DoFD on this issue.



It would appear to me that the issue of ownership remains unresolved, therefore so do the respective heritage obligations for preserving the site under either Commonwealth or State legislation.

Might I suggest that the RAAF Heritage Advisory Committee make contact with Council to determine what, if any, action has taken place. If nothing has happened it would be useful if Council could provide the Lot and Section number for the property and a copy of the registered title from their Lands Titles Office. The title should establish legal ownership. If no title is able to be located the Commonwealth will need to seek legal opinion as to the way forward. This matter would need to be discussed further between Defence and DoFD to determine who should carry the action.



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

WORLD WAR II BUNKER AT CONDELL PARK, BANKSTOWN, SOUTH WESTERN SYDNEY

Background

Mr Sayed Chowdhury, Political Analyst, strategy and Policy Unit from Bankstown City Council, has approached Air Force with some information about a WWII bunker. At its Ordinary Meetings of 24 October and 21 November 2006, Bankstown City Council resolved to explore the potential for preserving the site and to liaise with Commonwealth and State agencies to try to ascertain their interest in the project. An approach was made to the Office of Air Force History to ascertain the OAFH interest in the site. It was considered unwise for OAFH to give any expression of interest, as requested by Bankstown Council, in advance of consideration by the Defence Heritage Management section in CSIG and RAAF Heritage Advisory Committee.

Bankstown City Council is grappling with issues regarding long-term preservation and use of the site, and have identified Commonwealth/Defence interest as a critical element in resolving these questions. Specifically, when it comes to options for restoration, willingness to commit funding is a major consideration. Mr Chowdhury has sought advice from RAAF as to what support, if any, could be expected.

Purpose

The purpose of this brief is to provide A/DCAF with this information in order to determine a way ahead in relation to the responsibility for the restoration and funding for the WWII bunker.

Discussion

The World War II bunker is located at the corner of Marion Street and Edgar Street, Bankstown and is buried beneath the open space and surrounded by clusters of War Services homes (Photos at flag A). In the past, the site used to be known as the bushland of Black Charlie's Hill. The site was originally owned by the Bankstown Hospital Trust and was later on acquired by the Commonwealth. The site was selected for the underground RAAF and Allied Command Post because of its proximity to the airport and the relay stations around the area. The bunker was constructed circa 1943.

Description of the Bunker

It appears from the available drawings (floor plans and sections at flag B) and photographs of the interior that the bunker itself is a two-storey facility - a basement and a ground floor each 9 feet (2.75m) high - and measuring 117 feet 8.75 inches by 53 feet 9.5 inches (approx 35.9m x 16.4m). The walls were constructed from brickwork approximately two feet (60cm) thick, with floors and ceilings of reinforced concrete. The roof of the bunker was constructed of three feet (91cm) thick concrete to make it bombproof. There were two exhaust air stacks and an air intake stack protruding above ground.

The underground facility housed an extensive communication system, which was reportedly linked to a control tower at Bass Hill. The bunker had an emergency power plant, air conditioning and 50 telephones installed. During the war, this bunker was used by the No. 1 Fighter Sector HQ, RAAF as the Allied Command Post for the entire South Pacific operation. There was a code room, radio transmitter room, kitchen, buffet (dining) area, male and female bathrooms, bedrooms and the main operation hall had a huge wall map of the Southwest Pacific Area.

A Brief Post-war History: Rediscovered and Burned Out in 1970s

After the war, the facility was closed and was assigned a caretaker for three years, at the end of this period the facility was secured. Thereafter, the bunker complex had remained forgotten for nearly 30 years, except that in 1965 the facility was briefly occupied by the Navy in connection with the naval exercises in the Pacific. In 1971, the nine-acre site was handed over to the Commonwealth Department of Housing for developing War Services homes.

It was about this time that the existence of the underground headquarters was rediscovered in 1971 and the whole facility including all equipment, telephones and furniture were found to be intact (flag C). On Wednesday the 21 April 1971, The Sydney Morning Herald, The Daily Telegraph and The Torch simultaneously published news items disclosing the existence of the underground headquarters.

According to a front-page report (Underground RAAF HQ Offered to Council) in The Torch dated the 28 April 1971, the then Commonwealth Minister for Housing had announced that the Commonwealth would offer the headquarters building to Bankstown Council for community use and War Services homes are to be built on the remainder of the property. A condition of the arrangement would be that the underground facility would not be touched and the underground structure area would be set aside as an open space. It now appears that negotiations for handing over the bunker site to Council did not eventuate.

The War Services homes were built at the site during 1974 -1975. It is not clear whether the remainder of the land directly above the bunker was definitely excluded from the surrounding development for eventual handing over to Council as promised. Further research is also needed to find out whether the vacant land on top of the bunker forms part of adjoining strata plans or is still Commonwealth owned.

A year or two after its rediscovery in 1971, the underground historic facility was burned out. It was either an act of vandalism or a fire lit by homeless people who were squatting there.

of The Corroboree (Backyard adventure uncovers a wartime secret) that in 1987 he was able to identify the entrance to the bunker buried in the backyard of one of the adjoining homes and, with the help of the owner, eventually had managed to dig up a hole in the ground and crawl inside the bunker through a 50cm diameter vent pipe.

He described the burned out facility as, "at least two storeys high and just a blackened shell with lots of rooms and passages running off at various levels...."

An Internet search shows that as late as January 1996 the bunker was entered and photographed by a group known as "Bunker Boyz". Photos on their website show their members inside the burnt-out but structurally intact facility. The entrance to the bunker was reportedly resealed following an incident around Christmas 1996 when the Police Rescue Squad was called in after some youths were seen leaving the tunnel.

Historic Significance of the WW 2 Bunker

The WW 2 Bunker, which was the RAAF's No. 1 Fighter Sector HQ (1FSHQ) and Allied Command post for Southwest Pacific, is a large underground facility and could reasonably be described as being of historic significance to Australia and may be considered as an icon of Bankstown's war time history. According to the Australian Post (June 24, 1971):

"....General Macarthur paid several visits to the base to study aircraft movements....when he was Commander-in-Chief of the Allied Forces in the Pacific... It was the heart of our defence network where, in cooperation with the highest officers of Navy and Army, our bombers and fighters were controlled and manoeuvred in defence and attack against the enemy..."

The 1FSHQ had first relocated from Sydney CBD to a picture theatre in Bankstown. Once the underground facility was constructed, they eventually relocated to the Condell Park bunker during the last years of the War (circa 1943). Although mentioned in the newspaper report above, there is no confirmation that General Macarthur came to Bankstown.

Access to the Facility

Currently, the entrance and air vents are buried beneath the ground and are not identifiable. Reportedly, the main entrance to the bunker is now buried below the backyard of one of the villas. s47F mentioned above, even had named the owner of this home in his 1994 article. It may be possible to explore and identify the location of the entrance from the copies of plans (construction drawings) available and information from people who reportedly entered the bunker in the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s.

As already mentioned, without further research, it cannot be immediately confirmed whether the actual bunker site (the vacant land) forms part of the adjoining strata plans or is still Commonwealth/public land. The legal ownership of the open space and access rights from public roads are primary issues that need to be investigated and sorted out first, before any option for restoration and reuse can be effectively considered.

Potential and Options for Restoration

From the copies of plans and other construction drawings, the underground Command Post bunker appears to be a professionally designed and robustly constructed facility. Although furniture, soundproof wall claddings, ceilings, and artefacts were burned out, its concrete and brick shell is expected to still retain its structural integrity and soundness. It may be possible to restore the facility for suitable reuse, as a museum or a similar public facility, subject to the ability to provide legal and safe access and egress.

When it was rediscovered in the 1970s, its interior was completely intact and a series of photographs taken at that time is still available, and restoration of the interior to its war time look is considered still technically feasible. This would be an expensive option and as a significant historic project it would be likely to involve several key stakeholders.

Another option would be to get the structural integrity and safety of the burned out shell confirmed by experts and then use it as-it-is as a historical facility or a compatible tourism or community related purpose, including a WWII memorabilia museum or a light and sound WWII history show. For example, in Mallacoota near Melbourne, local RSL and Historical Society converted a WWII RAAF bunker at Mallacoota's airstrip into a military museum. Sappers from the Australian Army carried out the restoration work.

In Darwin, the East Point bunker where the army planned top end defence strategy during WW2 has been converted into a military museum. In Coffs Harbour, the City Council and the local Rotary Club joined hands and restored a derelict WWII bunker to house the Australia's largest original cartoon collection, known as Bunker Cartoon Gallery. Only minor alterations were made to ensure the historical integrity of the structure was preserved.

Factors for Consideration

- It is essential that the legal ownership of the bunker site is determined. Once this has been
 identified the responsibility for the feasibility of public access to it and any restoration can
 be progressed.
- It is possible that negotiations for handing over the bunker site to Council did not eventuate.
- Further research is also needed to find out whether the vacant land on top of the bunker forms part of adjoining strata plans or is still Commonwealth owned.
- The legal ownership of the open space and access rights from public roads are primary issues that need to be investigated and sorted out first, before any option for restoration and reuse can be effectively considered.
- A preliminary engineering, heritage and conservation assessment of the site should be done and if appropriate apply to have the site heritage listed. This status will facilitate involvement of Commonwealth and other stakeholders which may include the ADF, RSL, philanthropic organisations and the media - in the provision of funding, expertise and community support to help the project take off. For example, the President of the Bankstown Sports Club has already expressed interest in taking a proposal to his Board to help finance the restoration of the bunker.

Summary

It would be appropriate to refer the matter to the RAAF Heritage Advisory Committee to determine the way ahead and formally identify the legal ownership of the bunker. Once ownership has been identified other issues such as funding and restoration can be investigated. The first step for Air Force is to determine whether it has any legal ownership or responsibility for heritage matters relating to the bunker so that the Bankstown City Council can be informed.








The Bankstown Bunker is located below this area of land under Marion Reserve, corner of Marion and Edgar Streets, Condell Park.




Burned-out shell of the Bunker.














WWII BUNKER AT BANKSTOWN, NSW

Reference is made to my email dated 12 June 2008 regarding ownership of the WWII bunker at Bankstown, NSW.

Further investigations by Property Disposals have found that the area in question, then identified as Lot 18 in DP253720, was sold by the Defence Service Homes Corporation, NSW in 1977 for subdivision and development into strata lots. A surveyor's plan detailing a portion of the subdivision is attached for your information (refer Attachment A).

The location of the bunker is at the corner of Marion and Edgar Streets, Condell Park, not at Marion Reserve as previously suggested in documents provided by Bankstown City Council. The two locations appear to be entirely separate with only the former being of relevance to the bunker. The bunker seems to be located under a number of strata title town houses, however the location of the original entrance to the bunker facility is unknown to Property Disposals. Internet research suggests that an informal entrance is located within the back garden of one of the townhouses and that the bunker may still be frequented by amateur explorers.

Further inquiries also unearthed a photograph taken in 1943 which shows the construction of the bunker within a nine (9) acre plot (refer Attachment B). It seems from the photographs that the bunker may have been constructed to just above ground level.

It would appear that the Commonwealth does not own the land above the site of the bunker. However, it may be advisable to obtain legal opinion as to the current ownership of the bunker itself, as the transfer of land title may not have identified or included the underground facility. There also remain some questions as to potential liability for the structural integrity of the bunker and for injuries of any persons who may access the bunker.

I trust this information is of some assistance to your staff and their enquiries in this matter..








Red boundary indicates the original 9 acre site containing the Bunker

On 12 Nov 07 Bankstown City Council wrote to the Secretary seeking to ascertain Defence's interest in joining with Council and State agencies in preserving a WWII bunker which is located at Condell Park. The matter was referred by DepSec DS to HI, who subsequently passed it to ASPS for action.

I understand from speaking to Mike that you handled the issue and it was referred to DoFD (Guy Verney) as the land was not Defence. Mike's recollection is that DoFD refused to accept responsibility for the issue and passed it back to Defence, but he can't recall what happened with it from there.

ASEP has now been approached by AFHQ (AIRCDRE Dennis Green) for help on this matter. This approach is probably the result of him being contacted by Council because it hasn't heard anything back from Defence. Given PS Br past involvement in the matter could you contact AIRCDRE Green and discuss the matter with him

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
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

In late 2007 this matter was referred to the Department of Finance and Deregulation (DoFD) for action as the last "owner" of the site appeared to have been the then Commonwealth Department of Housing. Any disposal/transfer action of Commonwealth property around that time would have been handled by an agency now subsumed by DoFD - the former Dept of Administrative Services or the Australian Property Group.

ASPS wrote to Council advising them of the DoFD point of contact (copy attached). To date I have been unable to locate either a response from Council or DoFD on this issue.

It would appear to me that the issue of ownership remains unresolved, therefore so do the respective heritage obligations for preserving the site under either Commonwealth or State legislation.

Might I suggest that the RAAF Heritage Advisory Committee make contact with Council to determine what, if any, action has taken place. If nothing has happened it would be useful if Council could provide the Lot and Section number for the property and a copy of the registered title from their Lands Titles Office. The title should establish legal ownership. If no title is able to be located the Commonwealth will need to seek legal opinion as to the way forward. This matter would need to be discussed further between Defence and DoFD to determine who should carry the action.

Hope this assists.
